Born in Canberra, he graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree from the ANU in 1973 and then completed a Diploma in Education WA in 1975, moving to the Northern Territory to work as a teacher in Darwin. Between 1978 and 1981, he worked as a researcher at the Australian National University's Centre for Resource and Environmental Studies on the Aboriginal Children's and Families' Heritage Project.

Parliamentary Service

Elected to the House of Representatives for the Northern Territory, 1987, 1990 and 1993. Defeated at general elections 1996. Re-elected 1998.

Re-elected following 2000 electoral redistribution for Lingiari, Northern Territory, 2001, 2004 and 2007.

In his maiden speech in the House of Representatives on 17 September 1987 he opened with the following words:

I come to this place with a background as a teacher and a research worker. Immediately prior to my election, I was an employee of the Central Land Council in Alice Springs. I have lived and worked in both the centre and top end of the Territory as well as in some of the remote communities. In teaching, I worked for a number of invigorating and stimulating years with high school students in Darwin. As a researcher I had the honour and privilege to work with Dr H. C. 'Nugget' Coombs and Dr Maria Brandl on a three-year project examining the impact of government programs on Aboriginal children and families.

Warren lives in Alice Springs with his partner Elizabeth and their four children.

DFWA PUTS NEW GOVERNMENT AND OPPOSITION APPOINTEES AND THE INDEPENDENTS ON NOTICE

The Association welcomes the new Ministerial appointments and Opposition Shadows to the Defence and Veterans' Affairs portfolios. Prior to the election the DFWA lobbied political parties on the major issues that need to be resolved, including:

1. *Fair indexation of military superannuation pensions* - because, unlike the Age Pension and other welfare and superannuation pensions, the purchasing power of military superannuation pensions is not protected.
2. *Equitable treatment of veterans' disability pensions* - because the pensions of men and women who were disabled in the service of Australia have fallen behind in their value.
3. *Certainty in military compensation* - because ongoing indecision and uncertainty is stressful, unnecessary and unacceptable.
4. *Veterans' health care* - because mental health and residential accommodation for younger veterans in particular are issues that are increasing in frequency and severity.

UPDATE #253 of 17 August 2010 summarised the political parties positions on these matters and the Association will remind all elected representatives of the commitments they made and where further policy changes need to be made.

We are gratified that the Coalition, the Greens and the Independents supported proper indexation of military and commonwealth superannuation benefits. The Association, along with thousands of serving and retired military members, Defence widows and other military superan-

nuants now look to them to follow up on the support they previously publicly gave.

The time has come to put words into action.

BUT WHAT ABOUT THE MISLEADING FIGURES ?

The Association has been alerted to what is believed to be misleading figures for the costs of proper indexation of military and commonwealth superannuation benefits. Extensive financial analysis and explanation was provided support the claim.

It would appear that the Department of Finance has mixed nominal figures with discounted figures to produce a highly inflated view of the cost over the forward estimates to provide for proper indexation of superannuation benefits. This raises serious questions about the quality of actuarial advice that has been tendered to the Parliament from time to time. We believe an Inquiry into the Actuarial Costings and Assumptions that have held the financial security of 600,000 former military and commonwealth employees to ransom over the past 20 years, is warranted.

HMAS Toowoomba wins Five Fleet awards for 2009 and a United Nations Commendation

On 23 July 2010 HMAS *Toowoomba* (Commander Ivan Ingham) welcomed Rear Admiral Steve Gilmore, Commander Australian Fleet, onboard during his visit to Fleet Base West. The purpose of the Admiral's visit was to present the ship and her crew with a large and varied collection of awards.

RADM Gilmore began by presenting the Afghanistan Campaign Medal to ABMT Grant Dwyer, Australian Defence Medals to ABCSO Jared Turner, ABCTL Lucas Vine, ABMT Clinton Allen, and ABET Jason Williams. CHAP Steve Gunther received his Defence Long Service Medal, whilst CPOET Sean Mumme received his 1st Clasp to the Defence Long Service Medal.

The Admiral then presented *Toowoomba* with five Fleet Awards for 2009. The Silver Platter, awarded for the highest standard of food service management, recognises the importance of catering services for seagoing personnel. This is the second year running that *Toowoomba* has won the Silver Platter, noting that it was also awarded to the Fearless' chefs and stewards in 2008. The Admiral then went on to present the Action Information Organisation Proficiency Shield, the Electronic Warfare Proficiency Shield and the Combat Systems Proficiency Shield. After presenting the Pakistan Shield (for sporting achievements) to LSPT Nicky Gunthorpe, the Fleet Commander remarked that "this is the most awards I can recall giving to one ship!"

The formal award ceremony closed with Fleet Commander presenting *Toowoomba*'s CO, CMDR Ivan Ingham with a United Nations Certificate of "Commendation for Exceptional Services Ren-

dered To Shipping and Mankind". The commendation, presented at the Twenty-Six regular session of the Assembly of the International Maritime Organisation (IMO) by its Secretary General Efthimios E Mitropoulos, recognises *Toowoomba*'s achievements and contribution to the safety of merchant shipping in the Gulf of Aden during her Counter Piracy patrols in 2009.

The Fleet Commander congratulated the Ship's Company, making special mention of the hard work and the excellent results they achieved during their Unit Readiness and Mission Readiness work up and evaluations. The Admiral praised *Toowoomba*'s Fearless team for their efforts highlighting that the ship "demonstrated the highest level of professionalism and commitment which was well recognised by members of Sea Training Group and my Staff at Fleet Headquarters".

RADM Gilmore then joined a large group of the crew for breakfast in the Junior Sailor's Cafe where the conversation focused on life in the West and the exciting opportunities that will be presented by *Toowoomba*'s forthcoming participation in Ex KAKADU and a deployment to South East Asia with port visits to Indonesia, Singapore and Malaysia.

Further Scams

VETERANS WARNED OF POTENTIAL SCAMS

Veterans have been targeted by scam-artists claiming to represent the Australian Government, said Mr Ian Campbell, Secretary of the Department of Veterans' Affairs.

Mr Campbell said the Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA) had been made aware of several approaches to members of the veteran community asking for personal information in exchange for new government services such as free electricity or pension benefits. In some cases these people posed as officers from DVA.

"These 'offers' are false and my Department is investigating these incidents," he said. "Veterans in Queensland and Victoria have been most recently targeted, however veterans across the country should be aware of the potential scams. I urge the veteran community to exercise caution when asked to release personal details. Be cautious about when and to whom you release your personal information."

If you receive a phone call or letter asking for personal information such as your DVA client number or banking details, do not answer straight away. Contact your nearest DVA office on 133 254 (for metropolitan callers) or 1800 555 254 (for non-metropolitan callers) to confirm the source is legitimate.

"It is disappointing that our veterans are being targeted by these cowardly scams and I encourage members of the veteran community to contact DVA if they have any concerns," Mr Campbell said.

The Government's Scamwatch website – www.scamwatch.gov.au – contains useful information on how to protect your privacy.

PERSONAL ALARMS

Are you a Senior or have a disability and live independently in your own home? As full-time care is not always available, you can give yourself and your loved ones peace of mind that help can be summoned by simply pressing a button.

There are numerous monitored and non-monitored personal alarms available, e.g. IndiPendant, Red Cross, Care Alert, Vital Call etc. Also, all DVA Gold Card holders and those White Card holders with specific conditions which make use of a personal alarm necessary, are eligible to receive a free personal alarm. DVA will pay for an assessment from an Occupational Therapist, and if approved, the equipment will be provided and the Department will pay all ongoing monitoring fees. If the applicant does not have a telephone, or if the existing telephone is not suitable for a personal alarm installation (e.g. wall-mounted), the applicant will need to install a suitable telephone at their own expense. Similarly, if the applicant wishes to have a security key box fitted, that will be at their cost. Tel. **13 32 54** for further details.

The importance of possessing such an alarm was highlighted very recently, when one of our members used his in the early hours of the morning to summon an ambulance to take him to hospital.

So, do think carefully about it, as it could mean the difference between life and death – literally!

NEW GALLERIES TELL AUSTRALIA'S STORIES OF SECOND WORLD WAR

The Australian War Memorial is a special place for all Australians.

Recently the Memorial's galleries and grounds have undergone a significant redevelopment. For example the Australian War Memorial's Second World War galleries have been renovated to include new displays of vehicles and equipment used by Australians on land, in the air, at sea and on the home front during the Second World War.

Almost one million Australian men and women served between 1939-45 fighting against Germany and Italy in Europe, the Mediterranean and North Africa and against Japan in south-east Asia and the Pacific.

The Second World War also saw the Australian mainland come under direct attack for the first time. Japanese aircraft bombed Darwin and towns in north-west Australia and Japanese midget submarines attacked Sydney Harbour. The Second World War began in 1939 and it would six long years before peace returned to Australia.

The galleries tell the personal stories of Australians at war through large objects, audio visual displays, paintings, statues, photos, uniforms and personal recollections. They also highlight recent developments such as the science and technology behind the finding of HMAS *Sydney* which sunk in 1941 but whose whereabouts were a mystery until 2008.

Visitors can also see some of Australia's most unique vehicles. On entering the refurbished galleries one of the first things to see is an Australian built scout car, the "Dingo". The Dingo was one of several armoured vehicles manufactured in Australia during the War. It came about because of an early requirement to equip the Australian

Army with a locally built scout car because procurement from overseas allies was unlikely during the early stages of the war. The Dingo served mainly with the Australian armoured division as a

training vehicle in Australia and the Port Moresby area. It stands just metres away from a German Kubelwagen, a light-field car used by the German Army throughout the War for liaison and reconnaissance purpose

The Second World War galleries also explore the experiences of Australians on the home front and here visitors can inspect a beautifully restored civilian Studebaker sedan. This gleaming black car is fitted with a gas producer unit mounted in the rear which was developed in response to wartime petrol rationing. Nearby is an Anderson air raid shelter designed to protect families in their backyards in the event of an enemy air attack.

Other galleries in the Memorial include ANZAC Hall which houses the famous G for George Lancaster bomber. This is the centrepiece of the *Striking by night* exhibition which uses objects, light and sound to evoke the atmosphere of a night operation over Berlin in December 1943. ANZAC Hall also displays historic First World War aircraft in the multimedia *Over the front: the Great War in the Air* exhibition. The Conflicts 1945 to Today galleries explain Australia's involvement in military operations over the past 65 years while the First World War dioramas still count among the Memorial's greatest treasures.

Plan on visiting for at least two hours and take time to stroll the stunning new landscaped grounds of the Eastern Precinct. The new \$18 million Eastern Precinct has an impressive cafe and functions complex and extensive underground parking for visitors.

HMAS ENCOUNTER encounters SMS SEEADLER

Perhaps not the most successful, but certainly the most flamboyant, of the German raiders to operate in the Indian and Pacific Oceans in World War I was Count Felix von Luckner's *Seeadler*. Von Luckner had previously served in the raider *Moewe* during her successful cruise and on his return to Germany was given permission to outfit a raider himself.

He chose the captured British sailing ship *Pass of Bahama* which he had fitted with two 1,200 hp diesel engines. Her armament consisted of two 4 inch guns, two torpedo tubes and a good supply of machine-guns and small arms.

Seeadler slipped through the tight British blockade on 21st December 1916 disguised as a Norwegian timber ship, and sailed south to the good hunting grounds between Brazil and West Africa. Victims were not difficult to locate and in four weeks he caught 13 vessels. Included in the bag were three large British vessels, two British sailing ships carrying wheat from Australia, a Canadian schooner, five French sailing ships and an Italian and a Dane.

The 'hunting grounds' became unsafe when British cruisers were despatched to the area to investigate the disappearance of the vessels, and von Luckner sailed south round Cape

Luck was not to accompany him into the new area of operations. He scouted the length of the South American coast without sinking a single vessel and then sailed west to the Galapagos Islands. In these waters he captured three US sailing ships bound for Sydney but unfortunately he botched the sinking of one, which left a trail of wreckage which was soon reported. Every Allied warship in the Pacific was alerted to the presence of an enemy raider.

Von Luckner intercepted the increased wireless traffic that followed the alert and decided to hide-up in the Society Group. He arrived at the little island of Mopelia on 1st August and the next morning disaster struck. A sudden squall drove *Seeadler* onto a reef.

It was soon apparent the vessel was doomed and all boats and stores were moved ashore. When *Seeadler* was stripped she was fired and allowed to burn down to the waterline.

The raider's captain, with two officers and three sailors, set out in the ship's launch for Fiji on 21st August with the intention of seizing another vessel. However, luck was not with him and at Wakaya, von Luckner and his companions were captured by the coastal steamer *Amra*, manned by a party of Fijian police. The balance of *Seeadler*'s crew succeeded in capturing the French vessel *Lutece* and made their way to neutral Chile. Von Luckner was later taken to New Zealand as a prisoner of war.

In November HMAS *Encounter* was ordered to Mopelia to examine the wreck of the raider and CPO Ernest Stidston recorded the visit in his diary:

"9th November 1917: 1000 HMAS *Encounter* arrived Mopelia Island. We could see the German raider *Seeadler* on the reef between two islands. She had been set on fire before being abandoned and was practically gutted. Officers and men went aboard and found two 4.1 in. guns intact, and some ammunition which had escaped the fire.

"Through glasses, huts could be seen on the Island. Commander Wilmot, the Chaplain and Sub Lieutenant Harris set out to search the settlement which the Germans had built. They found a considerable amount of stores, enough to last some time.

"November 10th: A working party under Engineer Commander Brand and Lieutenant Commander Matheson boarded *Seeadler* and brought off one 4.1 in. gun and miscellaneous ship's gear.

"November 11th: 0600 A party went aboard the ship and put a charge (of explosive) in the remaining gun mounting and destroyed it.

"0900 We sailed for Tahiti, 260 miles away.

"November 14th: 2200. Our steam pinnacle on returning from shore (Tahiti) collided with an auxiliary yacht and sank in a few minutes. Fortunately there was no loss of life."

On 1 January 1923 HMAS *Penguin*, the Depot Ship at Garden Island, Sydney, paid off after 47 years of naval service. On the same day *Encounter* was renamed *Penguin* and recommissioned for service as the Depot and Accommodation ship. Painted white with buff funnels, and without armament, the new *Penguin* spent six years at Garden Island until reductions in defence expenditure necessitated her disposal. She paid off for the final time on 15 August 1929. In 1930-31 she was stripped at Cockatoo Island Dockyard.

What remained of *Encounter*'s hull was towed to sea and sunk off Sydney on 14 September 1932. She lies off Bondi Beach about 6.2 km (3.3 nautical miles) from Ben Buckler at a depth of approximately 74 meters and is still dived on regularly.
